

## BOARDS WITHIN WAIAU TOWN AREA...

The following boards are within easy walking distance as shown on the map on the inside of this brochure:

- 4 PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH/MUSEUM located on the village green.
- 5 HURUNUI/KAIKOURA EARTHQUAKE INFORMATION BOARD and HISTORICAL NOTICE BOARDS are located on the village green.
- 6 7 8 WAR MEMORIAL / RUGBY CLUB / WAIAU CRICKET CLUB: Boards 6, 7 & 8 are located up walkway by the tennis courts, with beautiful views.
- 9 ANGLICAN CHURCH located near cemetery.
- 10 DERRETTS STABLES located Montrose Street.
- 11 CATHOLIC CHURCH located along Clarence Street.
- 12 WAIAU SWIMMING POOL located by the Catholic Church on Clarence Street.
- 13 NASSELLA/CAMPING GROUND located at gateway of camping ground on Highfield Street.

## BOARDS ON THE OUTSKIRTS OF TOWN...

You may prefer to drive to view these boards:

- 1 2 3 TRAIN TO WAIAU / LIME WORKS / WAIAU BRIDGE: Boards 1, 2 & 3 are located south side of the Waiau River bridge under Old Oak tree in rest area.
- 4 HIGHFIELD WOOLSHED located about 1 km up the Inland Road to Kaikoura. View from the roadside. *Please DO NOT enter the property as it is a working farm.*

## BUSH WALKWAYS BOARDS...

The following two boards are at the start of short bush walks:

- 15 RIVERSIDE NATIVE WALK starts behind the Waiau Motor Camp, this is about a 30 minute loop track.
- 16 TUKE - NGAHERE WALK (FORBES WALK) this walk is on private land so **you enter at your own risk**. It is up a hill and takes around 80 minutes. Starting from the Village Green, follow the Inland Road to the sawmill corner, turn left onto River Road and cross the bridge. The start of the walk is a short distance (2 minutes) from the bridge on the right. There is a sign and information board there.



# WAIAU

*Waiau – River of swirling currents.*  
 In the Maori language 'Wai' means water  
 and 'au' means current.
